Provide picture dictionaries.
Use OHP for bar graph activity.
Copies of 2 different bar graphs
Look at SE1, p. 140

Review:

Do word web with transportation: elicit bus related vocab from Tuesday; review drive, ride, take, transfer, pay the fare, miss the bus, bus stop

Do bar graph – give everyone a copy and give them colored pens; use OHP
Talk about the graph

Then ask: How do you go to work? Car, bike, bus, walk? In the U.S., in Somalia?
 How do you go shopping?
 How do you go to the post office?
 How do you go to the hospital?
How did you come to the U.S.? – make a new graph

Introduce New Language:

Getting and giving rides: find out what they know; ask about their experience

A ride
Give a ride
Get a ride
Ask for a ride

Scenarios:

I can't find my bus card and so I call you. You have a car. What do I say?
You have a car and you see me waiting for the bus. You stop and ask: _____?

When do you give rides? When do you get rides?
Who gives rides? Who gets rides?
If you are driving and I am a passenger, you give me a ride.
If I am driving and you are a passenger, you get a ride.

Seat belts, smoking, cell phone use

Practice 1:

Give students handouts. Refer to top half of page. Give several options for answers.
Write on board and practice intonation. Use rubber bands.

Divide group into drivers and passengers. Do lines facing each other. Have people with cars ask partner if they need a ride.

Do second half of page. Practice intonation. Do activity again with passenger asking for a ride.

Practice 2:

Introduce conversations and practice them.

Practice as in language demo. Have them practice in pairs after practicing as a group.

Then tell them to use real information and create their own.

Have them practice and perform.

Extra:

Pass out picture dictionaries and ask them if there are other words they want to know.
